In preparation for the Easter holiday last week, FISH OF SANCAP assembled dinner baskets for families containing everything needed for a festive Easter dinner and children's bunny baskets filled with books, candy, small toys, school supplies and more. This year, the organization distributed an astounding 200 Easter dinner baskets and 200 bunny baskets to neighbors. Basket recipients are those known to FISH through usage of other FISH programs such as the Food Pantry and Emergency Financial Assistance. All baskets are assembled by FISH volunteers.

"The volunteers devoted to this program worked tirelessly to make sure everyone enjoyed the Easter holiday," said Maria Espinoza,

Executive Director, FISH. "It's incredible how this program has grown over the years and in particular since Hurricane Ian which we attribute to disaster related loss of income and unexpected repair expenses. For families served by FISH, under-employment and lost income from Ian are the main reasons struggles continue. Due to ongoing repair and rebuilding expenses, these individuals have become 'house poor'. House poor, by definition, means individuals spend too much on housing expenses relative to income. As it relates to hurricane survivors, it means the cost of repairing or rebuilding homes leaves little money left for living expenses, paying bills, or savings, resulting in debt accumulation for the duration of their recovery."

We'd like to thank Bank of the Islands for accepting food and candy donations and the Sanibel Community House, Sanibel & Captiva Island Assoc. of Realtors and many generous donors who contributed to the cause, making this a joyous holiday for all. "Our volunteers put a lot of time, energy and effort into making this a great day of celebration," continues Espinoza. "Their dedication, down to the tiniest of details like creating beautifully decorated baskets, is second to none."

Disaster Assistance Continues with Furniture Distribution



FISH OF SANCAP, with the United Way Gifts-in-Kind Program, continues to distribute furniture and rebuilding supplies through their Hurricane Ian Point of Distribution Program (POD). The program is available to Sanibel and Captiva Island residents and workforce.

Furniture and rebuilding supply distribution continues to take place every other Friday from 9:00 a.m. – 11:00 a.m, with a few exceptions. Upcoming dates of distribution include April 5th; May 3rd, 17th, 31st; June 14th, 28th and July 12th, 26th. The location for furniture distribution is 2430 Periwinkle Way.

Those seeking assistance with furnishings or rebuilding supplies must live or work on the islands and provide documentation to FISH team members. Households are limited to three items and will be allowed to view the staging area once their number is called. There are no reservations and items are available on a first called basis. We do not provide volunteers to assist with heavy lifting and requests individuals bring assistance and a large vehicle for transportation. Once items are selected, individuals have approximately 10 minutes to load selected items.

Please contact us or visit the our social media pages for updates on schedule changes. "We are pleased to partner with United Way to offer this valuable program to our community members," says Manuela Martinez, Disaster Administrative Director. "So many residents and members of our workforce have benefited from this program and are thankful for the assistance."

Since landfall, we have been assisting islanders and the workforce with disaster recovery. Now we are working toward reducing the burden and hardship caused by Hurricane Ian by ensuring support is available. We've coordinated resources with local and state organizations, and are providing assistance with emergency supply distribution, financial assistance, case management, and distribution of rebuilding supplies.

In addition to Long Term Recovery Services, we continue with programs representing our four major pillars – Food, Island Based Education, Social and Senior Services, and Helping Hands. We also continue to roll out and expand our traditional programs while simultaneously offering Long Term Recovery Services to community members, many of which have never had to ask for assistance before.



Our Director of Senior Services, Erika Broyles, always goes above and beyond. Here she is visiting a client in the hospital, bringing them a warm meal (from their favorite restaurant) and some comfort items. The client's family does not live in-state, so they were happy to see a familiar face during this isolating and difficult time.

Our visitation program includes helping seniors [and other] in many ways, including a recent technology visit to one of our older community members. During a scheduled home visit, an island senior asked the FISH team – Erika Broyles and Merari Salinas – to help with her electronic devices, specifically as it related to storage. She keeps pictures of her grandchildren and family outings on her phone and computer and connects them to a digital picture frame. She was having trouble accessing her photos, uploading and navigating her computer

file system. FISH was happy to assist, and was able to clean up storage space and show her how to organize her photos for easy access. In a note to FISH, the individual writes, "Thank you so much for your help with my laptop and iPhone. It felt like you did a deep clean of my pictures file. It gives me comfort that you are there for me if another problem with storage comes up. I admire how confident you are with your devices. Thank you both for solving my problem."

Sanibel Deli will provide lunch, complimentary to all guests. Giveaways and interactive group games are included. Monthly luncheons are held at the Sanibel Recreation Center, 3880 Sanibel-Captiva Road, each 2nd Tuesday of the month. A virtual option is also available. Reservations and meal choices are required by Fri., May 10 to Erika Broyles at FISH at 239-472-4775.

Space is limited and FISH requests RSVPs as soon as possible. Zoom instructions for those joining virtually will be provided with RSVP. There is no meal delivery for virtual participants.

Brad MacKenzie moved to Sanibel five years ago, and his beekeeping journey started the next summer, when his girlfriend gave him a beehive. Four years and a hurricane later, Sanibel Honey has over sixty hives at different locations - mostly homeowners' yards - throughout Sanibel.

Sanibel Honey is made solely by Sanibel bees from Sanibel flowering plants, and harvested and bottled by MacKenzie. The honey is - exactly and only - what the bees provide, made from the wide variety of blooming flowers, bushes, trees, palms and mangroves on Sanibel Island. The company also makes beeswax products, and will be introducing a no-see-um repellent next year.

"In the post-hurricane year, my first-year bees were busy building their hives and making enough honey to get through the winter," says MacKenzie. "They didn't make much surplus for us humans. This year, they will make more than ten times as much honey for me to bottle, so we're really looking forward to that!"

In this discussion, MacKenzie will discuss Sanibel Honey's mission and role in Sanibel's ecology and human community. He will also touch on the role of U.S. managed commercial honey bees, the unique post-hurricane opportunity for bees on Sanibel, the life cycle of the Honey Bee and more. Mental Health Wednesdays



We realize many storm survivors are struggling with emotional stress, trauma and anxiety. We've formed important partnerships to address these issues by partnering with SalusCare who offers counseling services on Sanibel to anyone who needs them.

According to Lee Health, "mental health issues after a catastrophic event like Hurricane Ian don't always appear right away. They can affect people for years. Studies show that survivors of life-changing natural disasters face increased risk of developing anxiety, depression and post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD)".

We continue to offer "Mental Health Wednesdays" by appointment between 11 a.m. and 4 p.m. at Saint Michael & All Angels Episcopal Church, 2304 Periwinkle Way, in a continued effort to address mental health needs and hurricane-related

topics such as PTSD, trauma, and loss.

In a recent study titled Association Between Repeated Exposure to Hurricanes and Mental Health in a Representative Sample of Florida Residents, it was noted, "recovery from natural hazards may be a protracted process; psychological distress may persist and be exacerbated by subsequent exposures.

This study's results highlight the need to address the mental health implications of repeated exposure to natural hazards, particularly in areas such as the Gulf Coast that are at high risk for repeated hurricane exposure, as risk of hurricanes and other climate-related threats is expected to increase.

Additionally, the anniversary of a disaster event combined with the upcoming hurricane season may cause survivors to experience symptoms such as worry, fear, panic attacks and other. "Reactions can involve several days or weeks of anxiety, anger, nightmares, flashbacks, or depression. And feelings of grief and sadness over the losses you've suffered, especially the loss of a loved one, are very common," notes Dr. Ronald Smallwood, a board-certified psychiatrist with Lee Health Behavioral Health.
